

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WMAIA ANNUAL MEETING 2024

WMAIA celebrated the season and design in Western Massachusetts with another festive gathering at the Olver Design Building at UMass on December 17, 2024. Many thanks to the Department of Architecture for hosting us!

With over 80 people in attendance, the evening included the presentation of an HON WMAIA Award to Prof. Timothy Rohan, the presentation of our student scholarships, and our 2024 Design Awards. Here's a recap of the evening:

HONORARY WMAIA

Every two years (even years), WMAIA bestows Honorary Membership upon a person or persons outside the profession of architecture. Prof. Timothy Rohan was the recipient of the Honorary WMAIA membership at this year's annual meeting. The award was presented in recognition both of his teaching -- work that inspires students to deeply understand their built environment and to value how design, broadly speaking, brings delight and utility to everyday life at multiple scales-- and, more particularly, for his work related to UMassBRUT. As stated in the nomination for Hon WMAIA, "Prof. Rohan co-founded UMassBRUT, the advocacy group for modernist architecture in the Massachusetts public university system. His vision and engagement with the UMass Amherst campus inspires students, staff and administrators to elevate the perception and acceptance of some of modernism's most maligned buildings, and to advocate for their sensible adaptation."

DESIGN AWARDS

The WMAIA 2024 Design Awards program was held in conjunction with the Western Massachusetts Section of the Boston Society of Landscape Architects, and was sponsored by Keiter Builders.

This year's awards were juried by colleagues from AIA Greenville South Carolina: Dustin Albright, AIA, LEED AP, Cary Perkins, AIA, Holley Bloss Owings LA, and Scott Crichton AIA, LEED AP. We were fortunate to have Dustin Albright present the awards.

Any building type or landscape project anywhere in the world completed at any time in the last seven years (after January 1, 2017) was eligible if the architecture firm/architect-of-record or landscape architect currently has its principal office in Western Massachusetts, which is defined for the purposes of this program as Berkshire, Franklin, Hampden and Hampshire counties or if the architect having a lead project role (i.e., Project Principal, Project Designer, Project Architect, Project Manager) is a member of WMAIA.

The sole criterion of the program is design excellence.

WMAIA received 15 entries. Two Honor Awards – the highest award category – were presented; two Merit Awards were given, and four Citation Awards were presented.

In addition, those in attendance at the awards presentation voted on an "Architect's Choice" Award, which resulted in a two-way tie.

HONOR AWARDS





HONOR AWARD - LANDSCAPE SHAW ELEMENTARY Dodson & Flinker Inc.

JURY COMMENTS: This is a really outstanding project. The jury loved how the ecofriendly practices of siting this school served to create outdoor learning labs. It's a model educational tool. Excellent execution of design choices including: bringing the meadow up to the building edge, the site furnishings, and the outdoor "rooms." The presentation photos clearly illustrated the design objectives. The jury loved how the design concepts are clear to the students. The jury commented that there is no downside to this project except the challenge of getting the students to go back inside.





HONOR AWARD

JURY COMMENTS: This is quite a nice project that is a real upgrade yet pays some homage to the original industrial building. The project took over a decade to complete and yet has a remarkable cohesiveness that could easily have been lost. The jury appreciated the spatial complexity, the effectiveness of the connecting stair, and the successful blending of steel structure with the warm wood. There is a strong combination of sustainable design strategies, including the sky-lit central space, the insulated metal skin, and the solar array, not to mention the creative adaptation and reuse of the building itself. There is a great relationship between indoor and outdoor spaces, and the outdoor spaces look fun and inviting. This could have been an architecture/landscape architecture submittal. Overall, an outstanding project, resulting in an outstanding community facility.

JURY COMMENTS: The jury was drawn to a handful of simple design decisions that made a big impact, including the choice of exterior materials and the detailing of the cladding. The jury liked the organization of the program and plan. This is a gem of a building positioned to take advantage of its beautiful site.

JURY COMMENTS: This is a lovely public building. The jury appreciated the well-articulated massing and the orientation of the different volumes. It's very well controlled for such a massive school building. It's a cohesive, interesting, kid-friendly environment. There is a fun, playful use of color and an abundance of natural light.





CITATION AWARI SUNDERLAND KAYAK SHED + BATHROOM Ko-LAB Architecture

JURY COMMENTS: There is a lot to love about this small, modest building that began as a student design project. The canopy over the kayak area is simply-conceived and well-executed. The kayak storage within the seating is clever and effective. The design really maximized storage area. The design made a lot out of a little. This proves it's possible to be creative on a tight budget.

JURY COMMENTS: It was clear that the design team had a detailed understanding of the site. The project highlights ecological resources throughout the design. The jury appreciated how the designers showcased accessibility – accessible trails are a noble thing. The jury appreciated the educational signage and the clear importance of habitat protection. Accomplished a lot within a modest budget.

JURY COMMENTS: While very much a restoration project the jury felt there was new life breathed into this project with the treatment of the details and attention to color and contrast. The jury particularly appreciated the interventions where there was a little more leeway, e.g. the bathrooms, marquee, and the new chandelier, which are very well done.



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COTE UPDATE JILL DECOURSEY AIA

One of WMAIA COTE's primary goals is to provide educational programming on sustainable building practices to our chapter that is both practical and of interest to Western Mass architects. Last year we dug into embodied carbon and the 2023 Stretch Energy Code. In 2025 we plan to continue delving into the energy code — with a focus on filling in the remaining gaps between theory and practice. There have been a good assortment of webinars and resources produced on the new code (if you have missed these, check out the BSA, Built Environment Plus, or DOER for resources). The challenge for many of us at this point is implementation of the energy code in our active and ongoing building projects.

This winter - WMAIA COTE is planning a series of roundtable conversations with local architects to discuss their first-hand experiences working with the 2023 Stretch Energy Code. Panelists will share local case studies as well as lessons learned from working with the new code. There will be plenty of time for questions and conversation. Our hope is that by sharing experiences and resources we will be able to support each other in successfully designing high performance, energy efficient, and code compliant buildings.

In November 2024, Governor Healey signed a groundbreaking clean energy bill advancing Massachusetts' climate goals. A key component is the creation of the 17-member Embodied Carbon Intergovernmental Coordinating Council, tasked with reducing carbon emissions in construction and transportation projects.

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
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EMERGING PROFESSIONAL SPOTLIGHT SHELBY PARRISH ASSOCIATE AIA

WHY IS LICENSURE IMPORTANT TO YOU?

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IN MEMORIAM: 1963-2024



Longtime WMAIA member John Aubin AIA, died December 18, 2024 at his home in Chicago after a brief encounter with a rare cancer. John was an architect, craftsman, maker, urban idealist, and adventurer. He was known to his family and many friends for his kindness, intellect, good humor, and endless curiosity about our world.

John took a geographically adventurous route to college, attending Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, the University of California at Berkeley, and the City College of New York, where he received his architecture degree. He was a licensed architect in New York, Illinois, and Massachusetts.

While a student in New York City, John lived in an East Village building that he and others rehabilitated, cementing his interest in urban redevelopment. He practiced architecture in New York City for ten years and built his mother a beloved home in Granby, CT before returning to Massachusetts to work on a real estate development project that John named Open Square.

Between 1999 and 2022, John redeveloped Open Square in Holyoke, a zero net energy mixed use development. His vision, talent, and belief in community transformed the underutilized but historically significant mill buildings into a vibrant mixed-use space combining commercial, residential, and creative tenants. John also incorporated sustainability into the project, refurbishing its two hydroelectric turbines, which generate about ½ megawatt of power. You may recall a 2015 WMAIA tour of Open Square where John let us get up close to those

The WMAIA will remember John with gratitude for his longtime participation in our community, and with deepest sympathy for those who loved him.



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
